Stark State College can now remotely access microscopes

Do you see the parame-

It is the story of a partnership formed many years ago between The Timken Company and Stark State College and one that has enabled both entities to partner with Ohio Supercomputer Center and The Ohio State University to access multi-million dollar microscopes across OSCnet, Ohio's public broadband network, formerly the Third Frontier Network.`

The electron microscopes, including the newest Titan electron microscope, allow researchers to image atoms through a range of magnifications. OSCnet is the first in the nation to successfully develop a program that students and researchers can use to access in real-time — these powerful and expensive pieces of stationary scientific equipment.
